New Irish Ambassador to speak at Holy Cross Cemetery Dinner

Ray Bassett, Ireland's new Ambassador to Canada, will be the guest of honour and headline speaker at a dinner to be held at the Delta Halifax Hotel on Thursday, May 19th. Ambassador Bassett arrived in Ottawa just a few months ago, but has been busy visiting many parts of the country ever since.


Proceeds from the dinner will help support the work being done by the Holy Cross Cemetery Trust and its many volunteers. The Trust was able to complete the cast iron fence along South Street in recent months, but is now facing expensive repairs at the corner of South and South Park as a result of a serious car accident. There are also hundreds of grave-stones still in need of repair, including several damaged in the same accident.

Recent events



Mossie Ó Scianláin (Scanlon) and Cian Ó Móráin (Moran), native speakers of the Irish language from the Corca Dhuibhne (Dingle Peninsula) Gaeltacht in County Kerry performed in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and PEI during their "Maritime Ramble" in the first two weeks of March. Mossie, who grew up next to Mount Brandon a few miles from Dingle Town (*Daingean Uí Chúis*), now lives in Australia. He is a superb *sean nós* (old style) singer and storyteller and generally a supporter and promoter of An Ghaeilge (Irish). Cian, a fine young musician who plays the *uilleann* (Irish elbow) pipes, guitar and low whistle, is also an accomplished storyteller. In his spare time, he is a doctor. The tour was organized by Leo Feinstein, a retired scientist and folksinger from Boston who spends several months a year in Halifax.



On March 11th, D'Arcy McGee Lecture at Saint Mary's Chair of Irish Studies was delivered by James M. Smith, an English professor at Boston College who has become an advocate for the victims of the Magdalen (or Magdalene) Laundries in Ireland. From the 1800s until the last of the laundries was closed in 1996, young, poor Irish women were forced into these hidden institutions and lives of servitude and misery, supposedly for their own good. The laundries were operated by religious orders, with the approval of both church and state and with complete disregard for the human dignity of the young women in their care. The story was a secret, no doubt an open secret in some corridors of power, until recent years. It has, as long last, finally come to light, to the everlasting shame of Ireland and many of its leaders, civil and religious. In November of 2010 the Irish Human Rights Commission called for a full public inquiry and compensation for survivors.



In its short history the Saint Patrick's Church Restoration Society's St. Patrick's Day Parade has never been blessed with balmy weather, but this year's cold and relentless rain was a challenge to even the most enthusiastic supporters. St. Patrick's Day falls on Saturday next year, so perhaps he will lend the marchers a hand and intercede for sun and warmth.
